There was a wide and varied array of exhibitors offering advice on Independence at Home, Mobility Vehicles as well as Networking and Advice Zones. The Sport and Activity Zone was managed by Nikki Griffiths and colleagues from Inspire Peterborough. Sandie Burns CEO of Disability Peterborough said "we were delighted to support this year's RISE 4 Disability event. We had a large number of people giving us very positive feedback. The one area we did identify was a massive disconnect between what equipment people needed and what they could afford."

Where are all the Traffic Enforcement Officers? Certainly not in Cowgate!



For several months my colleague Bryan Tyler and I have been working with Councillors, Council Officers and John Drewnicki, Chair of the local Traders Association to improve the parking situation in Cowgate. Just for once, there is a disabled bay bias in that part of the city centre and it's having a detrimental effect on businesses. Able bodied drivers wishing to pop into the printers or furniture shop to collect purchases or drop off items or

supplies are struggling to park close by and retailers are losing out. Cowgate is also difficult for goods vans and trucks to manoeuvre and it's made even more difficult by frustrated motorists parking in the Loading Bays, this means goods vehicles are blocking Cowgate until the motorist moves.

But rarer than hen's teeth are Parking Enforcement Officers. Several times I have witnessed drivers parking in the disabled bays without a Blue Badge and not a Traffic Officer in sight. Inconsiderate parking of any description causes resentment, frustration and ill-will but sometimes all it needs is some robust policing to stamp it out.

On a positive note to finish, well done the Disability Forum for bringing together the decision makers needed to make some positive changes to the disabled parking on Cowgate. Several new bays with rear and side hatching will be available in Kings Street as well as additional bays in Priestgate. Three bays will be lost on Cowgate but there will be a net gain of two additional disabled bays.

NHS managers wasted a staggering £500 million last year

In one case NHS managers staged a leaving-do at a prestigious members' club in central London with a bill that came to more than \pounds 1,000

And some hospital chiefs blew funds on slap-up meals for themselves.



They included a £1,000 gathering at a swish private members' club by bosses at London's Royal Brompton & Harefield NHS Trust. It feeds patients for less than £10 a head each day. Drugs worth £215,000 had to be chucked

at one hospital after a storage fridge broke down. Another trust wrote off $\pm 651,000$ owed by private patients. NHS chiefs are now curbing prescriptions for remedies which are cheaper over the counter.

Shopmobility-Peterborough's Hidden Gem

"Our volunteers are worth their weight in gold" says manager Chrissie

"It's amazing to think that back in 1984 Shopmobility Peterborough was



amongst the first in the country." declares a proud Chrissie Forvague, manager of the Queensgate based charity. For the past 35 years Shopmobility have provided wheelchairs and mobility scooters to thousands of people with disabilities and health conditions to enable them to go

shopping in Queensgate or sightseeing in and around the city centre. Long term hire wheelchairs and foldable scooters are also available for holidays etc.

Chrissie adds "we see ourselves as part of the community, people drop in for a chat, take a wheelchair or scooter, pop into the shops and come back to tell us all about their day. Our clients see the volunteers as friends and it's easy to see why, some of our volunteers have been with us for many years: Molly Wright has been with us since 1998."

Neil Elsom from West Town has been volunteering at Shopmobility for nine years. Neil said "I only came originally to help out for a few weeks but I'm still here years later. I love helping people and this is a great way of giving something back to the community". Retired pub landlady Angela Duley is another volunteer who was only supposed to be "helping out" for a few shifts but nearly two years later is still doing her bit. "I love talking to clients and I know many like to pop in for a chat. A lot of older and disabled people live alone and without Shopmobility, wouldn't be able to shop in Queensgate or wander round town. If I wasn't here on Mondays and Tuesdays helping out what else would I be doing? When I'm at Shopmobility I feel like I'm involved in something really worthwhile."

Major airports found to be failing disabled passengers

4 of the UK's 30 biggest airports are falling short in providing access for disabled travellers, the Civil Aviation Authority has said. Bottom of the list is Manchester, rated as "poor" for the second year running. Birmingham and London Stansted airports are also in need of improvement, the CAA said. In some cases, passengers had been left awaiting assistance for more than an hour, which the CAA said was "not an acceptable situation".

Dementia crisis will leave 100,000 victims with no beds by 2035



Thousands of vulnerable elderly people with dementia will end their lives 'isolated and alone' due to a rapidly growing shortage of care home places, a leading charity has warned. The Alzheimer's Society predicts the gulf between demand and supply for care home beds in England will reach 30,000 by 2022.

By 2035, it estimates the gap will be 100,000 - equivalent to the population of Lincoln. Society Chief Jeremy Hughes said. 'The crisis will be everywhere, even in the smallest village but the scale of the challenge is not being recognised. He described the idea that family carers would step in to help as 'flawed' because the pool of middle-aged carers is shrinking.

Disability sport: 'Lack of basics' stops people taking part



A lack of basic facilities and equipment prevents disabled people from taking part in sport, campaigners have said. They criticised a focus on finding future Paralympians rather than providing grassroots support.

Josh Reeves, a 21-year-old media student, tries to go to the gym at least once a week and has taken part in activities such as wheelchair karate. Mr Reeves, who has cerebral palsy, said there were only four machines he could use at his nearest gym, with a membership costing £35 a month. Instead he uses a cheaper gym that is more accessible, calling the general picture "shocking".

"There should be more sports and facilities out there for people with disabilities." said Josh

Dan Williams, 26, who is registered blind, set up a monthly tandem cycling group for visually impaired riders. "I don't want to be the next Paralympian; I just want to ride a bike like everybody else. We only have four tandems at the moment and we would like to have a fleet of at least 15 to get a lot more blind and partially-sighted people out there."

Earlier this year, a survey of 600 people showed "access to sport by disabled children and adults is perceived to be very patchy in many areas and across many sports with accessible changing rooms and direct access to the sporting facility often lacking".
